From the Pastor's Office

What do you want for Christmas?

The question is one that, as an adult, is almost always met with an exhausting groan of "I don't know." My siblings and parents have no idea what to ask for, my husband has no idea what to put on his list, and if I'm honest, I really don't need any more things, so I am never really sure how to answer. Which is probably part of the problem with the question - Christmas gifts are *things*. They are almost always tangible items that are able to be wrapped up in wrapping paper or gift bags to be set under the tree and then unveiled on Christmas. But I really don't need more things. Now as a child, I relished in the question. I wanted lots of things for Christmas. My kids also want all the things for Christmas. They have circled about 300 things in the toy catalogs that have arrived in the mail, as if Christmas is some sort of free vending machine of toys and electronics.

But as an adult, I just really don't know what I want to add to the Christmas lists. Perhaps because the things I really long for, aren't gifts that can be wrapped or in some cases, even possibly given to another person. I want a long nap. I'd like a whole day off where no one needs anything from me. I'd like a tropical vacation away from these painfully low temperatures. I'd like someone to come to my house and meal plan, grocery shop, and prepare the meals for the week. Any volunteers? No? Okay. Then I'll settle for world peace.

Truly the things my heart desires are not things that can be given to another person. I desire hope, light, joy, and rest. I desire a fair and equitable world, free of hunger, suffering, and greed. I desire deep seeded contentment and communal care and joy of our neighbors. They are not things that can be wrapped up in a bow and handed from one human to another. And yet they are things that we are told can be wrapped in swaddling cloths and handed to all of humanity in the form of a helpless infant.

This Advent, as we light the candles on our wreaths, we light candles for hope, joy, love, and peace. We pray for these gifts to come into the world, trusting that it is only through Jesus that any of these things can really be given. Perhaps, it is in the lighting of these candles and the coming together for worship that we can give each other the gifts that our hearts long for - for the hope, joy, love, and peace that world yearns to receive. And perhaps, we can help give glimpses or moments of those things to our neighbors this season through our faithful worship and service of one another, because if you are anything like me, those are what you really want for Christmas.
